Description: In 1923, President Calvin Coolidge led America in the lighting of its first official National Christmas Tree on the Ellipse south of the White House. That year, seasonal music was provided by a choir and the U.S. Marine Band. In the decades that followed, this event became known as the Pageant of Peace -- a tradition whose form and location would shift from time to time, but which always offered the nation a shared occasion marking the beginning of the holiday season. Sometimes, the event would reflect world or national events, as when the lighting was postponed to allow the nation to mourn the death of President Kennedy. Often, the entertainment would feature internationally known artists like Placido Domingo, Aretha Franklin, José Feliciano, Maya Angelou and many others. As we near the 100th anniversary of the Pageant of Peace, now known as The Lighting of the National Christmas Tree, it seems an appropriate time to look back at this aspect of our national heritage.

In addition to discussing the history of the Pageant, Joe Fab will share his personal experience producing this event for almost 20 years as well as his experience working with numerous artists and several US presidents.

Biography: Joe Fab is an award-winning and Emmy-nominated producer, director and writer with more than 40 years' experience in documentary film production, media and communications, event production and the live presentation of plays and music. Although he is best known for his documentary films like "Paper Clips" and "When My Time Comes," he was also a key player in the Pageant of Peace for almost two decades, working with Presidents George H.W. Bush, Bill Clinton and George W. Bush as well as a vast array of well-known performers. For much of that time he was

responsible for writing and co-producing the event on the Ellipse, learning the nearly century-long history of the celebration, and accumulating a personal collection of memories and behind-the-scenes anecdotes.

Description: Spurred on by the death of her husband, the Peabody-Award-winning NPR journalist Diane Rehm crossed the country to take an in-depth look at Medical Aid in Dying (MAID), a controversial, often-misunderstood end-of-life option for terminally ill patients who have six months or less to live and who are deemed capable of making their own medical decisions and meet certain legally prescribed criteria. It is authorized in 10 states and the District of Columbia and is also under consideration in many other state legislatures.

The film tells the personal story of Ms. Rehm and her husband of 54 years, but it also explores what medical aid in dying is – and what it is not. It is not suicide, in which the individual has the option to live but chooses not to. Rather, it offers someone whose death is imminent the ability to avoid extreme suffering at the end of life. As one Maryland lawmaker told Ms. Rehm, "Each of us is just one bad death away from supporting these laws."

Two weeks prior to the class, participants will receive a link to view the movie. During the class Joe Fab will discuss making the movie, including his personal experience documenting this issue.

Biography: Joe Fab is an award-winning and Emmy-nominated producer, director and writer with more than 40 years' experience in documentary film production, media and communications, event production, and the live presentation of plays and music. He is the recipient of a national Emmy nomination for *Paper Clips* (theatrical and HBO documentary), the Christopher Award for achievement in media that affirms the highest values of the human spirit, and the Discovery and Imagination Award (previous recipients included Dr. Jane Goodall and Christopher Reeve), to name just a few. F21-081, Fourteenth Colony: The Forgotten Story of the Gulf South During America's Revolutionary Era

Description: The British colony of West Florida—which once stretched from the mighty Mississippi to the shallow bends of the Apalachicola and portions of what are now the states of Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, and Louisiana—is the forgotten fourteenth colony of America's Revolutionary era. The colony's eventful years as a part of the British Empire form an important and compelling interlude in Gulf Coast history that has for too long been overlooked. For a host of reasons, including the fact that West Florida did not rebel against the British Government, the colony has long been dismissed as a loyal but inconsequential fringe outpost, if considered at all. But the colony's history showcases a tumultuous political scene featuring a halting attempt at instituting representative government; a host of bold and colorful characters; a compelling saga of struggle and perseverance in the pursuit of financial stability; and a dramatic series of battles on land and water, which brought about the end of its days under the Union Jack. In *Fourteenth Colony*, historian Mike Bunn offers the first comprehensive history of the colony, introducing readers to the Gulf Coast's remarkable British period and putting West Florida back in its rightful place on the map of Colonial America.

Biography: Mike Bunn is a historian and author who has worked with several cultural heritage organizations in the Southeast. He currently serves as Director of Historic Blakeley State Park in Spanish Fort, Alabama, editor of Muscogiana, the journal of the Muscogee County (Georgia) Genealogical Society, and Chair of the Baldwin County Historic Development Commission.

Description: Jed Duvall covered the Vietnam War for CBS News in 1970 and 1971. Saigon was his base--a place to get a shower before heading back to the bush to be with American GIs.

Participants will hear first-hand from a reporter who spent a year and a half among American troops in Viet Nam--what they said, where they lived and slept, what they ate, their feelings about their own officers, and how some died. We will visit with the GIs--"Grunts" "draftees" "volunteers" and their sergeants and young officers who were there in the mud and dust and jungle fighting the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese Army. In other words, our 18 year-olds against their 18 year-olds. Jed will also describe his worst personal fright: being caught in a flood along the central coast of South Vietnam along with three jeep-loads of reporters and photographers. Rescued only through the intervention of a veteran U.S. Marine Corps Sergeant at the DaNang Press Center who alerted his Colonel to send a helicopter to pick them up.

Biography: Jed Duvall was born and raised on Long Island, NY. He received a Bachelor's Degree in Business from Duke University in 1959. He spent two years in the U.S. Navy and then began in the news business in 1961 at WBAL AM and TV in Baltimore. Six years later he moved to CBS News, a division of CBS Inc. in NYC.

With CBS he was assigned to the New York City Bureau followed by the Los Angeles Bureau until joining the Saigon Bureau in 1970. He covered the invasion of Cambodia by U.S. forces in 1970 and the invasion of Laos in 1971 by South Vietnamese troops (ARVN) with the support of American forces. After Vietnam, Jed reported for CBS News from Atlanta and then Washington, D.C., where he helped cover the Watergate cover-up trial. Subsequently, he worked for ABC on "Nightline" for a while, then was free lance for CNN and others until he and his wife retired in Rappahannock.

Description: This class will be presented live via Zoom from Istanbul. It will cover the history of the city from its founding as Byzantion in 660 BC, later to be known as Nea Roma and Constantinople, to present day Istanbul.

Istanbul, as the capital of three great empires – Roman, Byzantine and the Ottoman – has a very diverse and rich history. It is one of the most unique cities in the world.

In 330 AD, Constantine the Great chose Byzantion as the new capital for the Roman Empire. The name of the city was first changed into Nea Roma (New Rome), later to Constantinople. Constantine the Great contributed many public buildings, streets, monuments and a forum bearing his name. He built new walls enlarging the city. The population is believed to have risen from about 25-30,000 to 170,000 during his reign. He allowed Christianity and started building churches including the first version of the Hagia Sophia and Hagia Eirene.

Theodosius I banned paganism with an edict in 392 AD, and in 395 AD he divided the Roman Empire between his two sons. The Western Roman Empire collapsed in 476, but the Eastern Roman Empire (also called the Byzantine Empire by historians) continued for more than 1000 years.

In 1453, Istanbul became the capital for the Turkish Ottoman Empire until 1923 when Atatürk moved the capital to Ankara with the new secular republic.

NOTE: This will be three firsts for the Manassas LLI: first presentation from a different country, first presentation from a different continent, and first presentation from a different hemisphere. With the time zone difference between Manassas and Istanbul, it will start at 10AM to us, but 5PM to Mr. Yenen. One other curiosity is that we don't know from which continent he will speak, as the line between Europe and Asia passes right through Istanbul, up the Bosporus (the waterway which divides the city and the continents).

Biography: Serif Yenen is a travel specialist, tour guide, travel writer, filmmaker, international keynote speaker and lecturer. He wrote *Turkish Odyssey* in English, the "first guidebook of Turkey ever written by a Turk." Yenen gives lectures about travel and Turkish history and culture, the majority of which are in academic communities. His guidebooks are used as textbooks or are on suggested reading lists at various universities, and his articles and columns are published in international magazines and national newspapers. He has given numerous presentations for the Smithsonian Associates, both in person at the Smithsonian Institution in Washington D.C. and also via Zoom. He has also been a guest speaker for the Penn Museum in Philadelphia, the Boston University, the University of Washington, the American Turkish Societies, the Boston Cultural Festival, Stormont Parliament Building in Belfast, various libraries and many more places. Serif Yenen has been leading tours in Istanbul and all over Turkey since 1989. He was designated Best Tourist Guide of the year 2006 by Skalite and has been asked to give guiding services to such noted people as Pope Benedict XVI, Oprah Winfrey, Matt Lauer and Lester Holt (Today Show-NBC). He continues his signature tours with a focus on culture, history and culinary experiences.

<u>George Washington Memorial Parkway</u> History & Significance – presented by <u>Matthew Virta</u>, Cultural Resources Program Manager. How did the national park known as the George Washington Memorial Parkway come about? And is it more than just a road? The park owes its existence to many factors: an idea from the 1880s to create a special kind of route from Washington, D.C. to Mount Vernon, a goal to improve city planning and provide park opportunities for the nation's capital, and a desire to protect the lands along the Potomac River, among others. At the heart of it all is the roadway, a uniquely designed national parkway that was literally and figuratively ground-breaking for its time. This presentation will discuss the planning history, engineering and landscape design of this significant historic property that is listed in the National Register of Historic Places.

The Untold Story of Theodore Roosevelt Island - presented by Megan Bailey, Cultural Resources Specialist.

Measuring just 90 acres, Theodore Roosevelt Island may be small, but it has a mighty history that stretches back thousands of years. Today this island in Washington, D.C. is managed by the National Park Service and serves as a memorial to the conservationist, outdoorsman, and 26th President, Theodore Roosevelt. But in the past this island has been occupied by Native Americans, plantation owners, the 1st Regiment of U.S. Colored Troops, the Civilian Conservation Corps, and even FBI agents. This talk will highlight the fascinating and lesser-known history of the island.

Biography: <u>Matthew R. Virta</u> has worked as an archeologist and cultural resources professional for the National Park Service (NPS) for nearly 35 years. Currently he is the Cultural Resources Program Manager for the George Washington Memorial Parkway (GWMP), where he has been employed since 1999, planning and managing identification, documentation, and preservation projects for the park's archeological sites, historic structures, and cultural landscapes. Before joining the GWMP, Matt was employed as a Staff Archeologist and Archeology Laboratory & Collections Manager for the NPS, Denver Service Center, Eastern Applied Archeology Center, conducting archeological investigations and curating archeological collections for national parks from the mid-Atlantic through the northeast. Prior to that, he was employed in a similar capacity serving parks in the greater Washington, D.C. area with the NPS, National Capital Region Archeology (archeology) and a master's degree (1986) in archeology & cultural resources management from the University of Maryland, College Park.

<u>Megan Bailey</u> serves as the Cultural Resources Specialist at George Washington Memorial Parkway, where she works to preserve and protect the park's historic properties, archeological sites, and other cultural resources. Prior to joining the National Park Service, she earned a doctorate in anthropology and worked as an archeologist for historic sites in the Mid-Atlantic region.

Description: This class will consist of two consecutive presentations.

Wrangell-St. Elias National Park and Preserve, Alaska. Wrangell-St. Elias is America's largest National Park. It rises from the ocean up to 18,008 ft. At 13.2 million acres, the park is the same size as Yellowstone National Park, Yosemite National Park, and Switzerland combined! Mount St. Elias is the second highest mountain in both Canada and the United States. Nine of the 16 highest peaks on U.S. soil are located in the park, along with North America's largest subpolar icefield, glaciers, rivers, an active volcano, and the historic Kennecott copper mines. Mt. Wrangell, at 14,163 feet, is one of the largest active volcanoes in North America. The Malaspina Glacier, larger than the state of Rhode Island, is the largest non-polar piedmont glacier in North America. Within this wild landscape, people continue to live off the land as they have done for centuries. This rugged, beautiful land is filled with opportunities for adventure.

<u>Valles Caldera National Preserve</u>, New Mexico. About 1.25 million years ago, a spectacular volcanic eruption created the 13.7-mile wide circular depression in the Jemez Mountains of northern New Mexico now known as the Valles Caldera. The preserve is known for its huge mountain meadows, abundant wildlife, and meandering streams. Hot springs, streams, fumaroles, natural gas seeps and volcanic domes dot the caldera floor landscape. The highest point in the caldera is Redondo Peak, an 11,253 ft. resurgent lava dome. Also within the caldera are several grass valleys. Each year thousands of visitors come to Valles Caldera National Preserve to explore the unique geology, view wildlife, and learn about the historic cabins and prehistoric sites. It is a place to have fun and make lifelong memories.

Diane Ellsworth grew up in Ohio and attended Penn State, earning a degree in Secondary Education. Seeking adventure, she moved to Alaska, where she taught high school English and art in four different villages before settling in Copper Center, on the edge of Wrangell-St. Elias National Park and Preserve. There she raised her family and became an "in-holder," acquiring land through her husband, who has since passed. In 2010 she began working seasonally for the NPS as an interpretive ranger, and now she serves as the Youth Programs Coordinator, working with a Student Conservation Association and local Youth Conservation Corps. This is her 10th season as a Ranger with the park. In its off season (which starts at the end of September), she will remain in her home in the park and work with the youth groups. Year-round, she lives with a 13.2 million acre backyard.

Educated as an evolutionary ecologist, she has also always had a passion for human history and geology. Description: We all know that renewable energy is the way of the future. But what is the practicality of residential Electric Voltaic solar panels on each house in the neighborhood? Many houses do not face the correct direction. Home Owners Association restrictions and installation of such units can be onerous. However, Neighborhood Solar Farms are now an option thanks to Virginia's new solar regulation aiming to resolve these problems locally. This class will explore the feasibility of these systems, the competitive cost of the energy produced, the drastic reduction in emissions, and environmental impacts to air, water and land. The potential impact from the upcoming electrification of our cars and the simple fact that those cars will be charged at our homes is an important component of the whole equation. It takes about 50 to 100 KW to charge an electrical car for one use. That energy cost will become part of the normal residential bill.
